From Sand to Riches: the Sahara

Thanks to growing investments in renewable sources, this type of energy, and the technology needed, have become cheaper and cheaper, up to the point that a new herculean project has been given the green light: the Sahara solar panel farm.

The Sahara solar panel farm is an ongoing project located in the desert of the same name. It has the approval of the British Premier Gordon Brown and French President Nicholas Sarkozy. The goal is to build a solar panel farm the size of Wales.

It is estimated that by 2050, the Sahara solar farm alone would produce 100 GW (as of 2010, wind related energy production worldwide is of 198 GW), and there are already plans to expand the size of the project and researches going on in several continents to upgrade current technologies and adapt them to the climate.

If everything goes according to plan, in less than fifty years the Sahara plant will be the leading clean solar source of energy worldwide, an ever-growing project completely green thanks to the technologies being developed. From sand to riches, where it was thought there was nothing, a shining ecologic future awaits.
